Danville in the Twilight of the Year: Muscle, Art, and Mistletoe

The days are beginning to shorten and the shadows lengthen as we approach the end of another year. Yet the next three months will still be a time of activities, events and festivities in downtown Danville.

Three very different races close out 2016. The River Towns Race Series concludes with the Robbins Run 5k/10k on October 15. The Robbins Run will occur on the Robbins Trail and the Old Reading Line at the Hess Recreation Area, a beautiful place that Danville area residents have enjoyed since the 1890's. Both the 5k and the 10k will happen on tree-lined trails paralleling Mahoning Creek. For more information and to register visit www.rivertownrace.com.

On November 13 the Central PA Cyclocross Race Series will hold the first of three races – the Meaty, Beaty, Big & Bouncy Cyclocross. Not for the faint of heart, the course features hairpin turns, a fire jump, and hurdles – what could go wrong? The venue will be in Riverside, only a short distance west of rash and reckless. ment (karaoke anyone!), especially on the weekends. More information about our local restaurants and their events can be found at http://visitdanvillepa.org/membership/.





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Neighborhood Thinking – What Is On Our Minds?

While the Main Street organizations are in the limelight, what are the neighborhood organizations doing? How is it different? Downtown promotion groups have a broad agenda and a broader audience. They keep a close eye on economic development, foster a lively events calendar appealing to tourists and locals alike, keep the name of the town out there in the media ever in a positive light, and focus on design and presentation in the central commercial areas.

Meanwhile the neighborhood groups have a tighter and often more pragmatic range of interests. Where the Main Street group looks for a balance between regional draws and local services, the residents are concerned about maintaining outlets that serve everyday errands, like groceries, hardware, books, and convenience items. In addition, they work both to enhance the sense of community with neighborhoodoriented events and clean ups and to improve communications in the municipality with informational meetings and programs.

If you are in the Lewisburg Area, even if you don't live in the Borough, you may also be interested in the River Town Team events and activities like park planning or Bike/Walk promotions. In addition to the items printed on the schedule here, we also expect to hold a wetlands walk and a Route 15 crossing tour by the end of the year. Many towns were born where roads intersect and Middleburg was one of them. Its history is rich and it has endured through many changes and challenges. But with routes 104 and 522 dictating the towns' shape, the "downtown" section has had to shift and expand outward. More and more businesses are springing up on the outskirts of town where parking is easier to procure.


Over the past 50 years, many of the historical buildings in the downtown area were taken down or completely renovated, often in the interest of progress. However, that progress now feels rather hollow as much of the historical architecture is either missing or unrecognizable. As the Middleburg Revitalization Committee began to brainstorm about moving forward, they realized that moving forward would require looking back. The people of Middleburg need to know their history and celebrate where they came from; they need to be proud of their town and work together to make it a place where people WANT to work and live and raise their families

With that in mind, the MRC is presenting "A Log Cabin Christmas" event on December 2, 2016 from 6-9 p.m. There is an amazing log building that sits just off the beaten path behind the IGA grocery store and in the interest of highlighting some of the historic sites that still exist, this building will be open to the public. In conjunction with the Snyder County Historical Society and Museum, the MRC is working to make history come alive this holiday season. Special staging of the log cabin will transport those attending back in time. Toy candy, popcorn balls and hot cider are just a few of the treats to be enjoyed by candlelight. Some log cabin facts: The Log Cabin located at the entrance to Glendale Cemetery was originally owned by George Motz, circa 1770's, originally constructed for the purpose of a Currier Business. On the same plot of land Mr. Motz built a home and a Tannery Business. This information is supposition according to land grant research at the Snyder County Historical Society. The land grant was signed by John Penn, brother of Thomas Penn and sons of William Penn in Philadelphia in 1773.

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

The Milton Model Train Museum



The Milton Model Train Museum, which is under the umbrella of TIME, is a unique and nostalgic place for people of all ages from throughout the area to enjoy.

The creation of the museum and display stems from the generous donation of the Rev. A. Robert Walker's personal collection and layout in 2007. The centerpiece is a permanently installed, 20 ft. by 60 ft. platform layout with many operating O gauge scaled model trains, set within a 1950's era replica of Milton featuring numerous landmark buildings and familiar settings.

A group of local model train hobbyists, some highly regarded as specialists, oversee continuing operations. Barry Mabus is the committee chairman.The Milton Moose Family Center, at 139 South Front Street, generously donates the use of its third floor for the display. This space is filled with memorabilia relating to the trains and to Milton, and the banquet facility on the second floor is available for occasional gallery displays and other special events.

Primarily, the Milton Model Train Museum is open to the general public during the Christmas holiday season, with free admission. It is also open during the Moose Children's Fishing Derby and the Milton Harvest Festival. The Model Train Museum is available throughout the year for private events such as high school class reunion visits, educational school field trips, and private parties. It promotes tourism from many local communities, particularly involving model railroad enthusiasts.



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Honoring Vietnam Veterans

— A COLLECTION OF VIETNAM VETERANS' STORIES — A part of the proceeds will be donated to local veterans organizations


"Honoring Vietnam Veterans" featured 53 veterans who served, and included combat veterans, pilots and those who served in support roles. There were Marines, Army artillerymen, combat soldiers, Navy corpsmen, Air Force personnel and Navy Seabees and specialists.

Hopefully, through the stories these men shared, you learn a little more about the Vietnam War, easily the most misunderstood in America's history.

Vietnam was the first war in which American combat soldiers were outnumbered so significantly by those in support roles. As a general rule, there were roughly 10 troops supporting every combat soldier in the field.

It took everyone to wage the war in a country tens of thousands of miles from home on terrain the enemy was more than familiar with, having ousted invaders for centuries, including the French in the years prior to America's involvement.

Vietnam became known as the "Helicopter War" due to the necessity of the chopper, specifically the Huey (UH-



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1), to get troops in and out of areas largely inaccessible to traditional vehicles.

Nearly 59,000 Americans lost their lives in the Vietnam War. Hundreds of thousands more were wounded.

Those who made it home were often treated poorly, ignored or chastised for their service. As the war progressed into the late 1960s and early 1970s, anti-war sentiment escalated stateside with protests amid growing misconceptions about the war fed predominantly by media reports and speculation.

One of those misconceptions revolved around the draft. Public perception was that the war was being fought largely by draftees, which simply was not the case. Around 70 percent of those who died in Vietnam were volunteers. Of the more than 58,000 who died in Vietnam, only 17,425 were draftees.

Many of those who served in Vietnam did so for the same reason their fathers and grandfathers served during World War II and Korea — out of a sense of duty. They returned home to an unsympathetic public and, at times, were greeted by commanding officers advising they remove their uniforms to avoid protesters at airports.

Still, the Vietnam veteran fought admirably, heroically, for country and for his fellow brother in arms. It was not the fault of the soldiers, airmen, Marines and seamen that the war became political.

The politicization of the war became evident following Tet of 1968 when Gen. William Westmoreland requested Congress send more troops to defeat the depleted forces of the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese Army. That request was not granted and in fact, Westmoreland was soon pushed out, replaced by Gen. Creighton Abrams, who advocated the pacification program. When Richard Nixon, who was elected on a platform of "Win With Honor," took office, the troop drawdown began.

The opportunity the United States had to "win" the war was snatched from it by a Congress unwilling to finish what had been started. The Vietnam War veteran was a stalwart, ranking among America's finest fighting forces.

Hearing the stories of these heroic men is at times heart-wrenching. Not only did they answer the call of their country and serve with honor in what at times can only be considered horrific conditions, these men had to endure another war raging stateside once they returned.

It's a sad chapter in American history. I'd like to thank these brave men for sharing their stories. It is my hope that through their service and sacrifice, we can all learn a little more about this wonderful generation of American heroes.

Let us all promise to never subject another generation of American servicemen and women to the treatment endured by the Vietnam veteran. When the call is made, it is the soldier that answers the call — without question.

To all Vietnam veterans, thank you for your service and welcome home.
